EC Grants 25 million birr to CSOs



The European Commission Delegation to Ethiopia signed agreements with representatives of 11 civil society organisations whose project proposals were selected for funding under the EC programme of capacity building and governance service delivery. The agreement which was signed on March 2, 2007 at the Delegation's head office in Addis Ababa provides financial support to civil society organisations to the tune of 25 million birr under a tripartite arrangement in which the Donor, Government and CSOs cooperate on a regular basis. Speaking on the occasion, Ambassador Tim Clarke, Head of the EC Delegation to Ethiopia, said that the 11 projects selected for funding "will make a difference in fostering the capacity of Ethiopian civil society organisations to work, participate and dialogue". The 11 projects launched today were selected out of 208 project proposals submitted in response to the EC's call for applications. The signatory CSOs will be partnering with 53 other CSOs for implementing their projects.

One of the 11 winners of the grant is the Forum for Social Studies (FSS), which will receive funding totaling about €146,000. The FSS project, which has a lifecycle of about two years, comprises the following components:

- building the institutional capacity of FSS through staff development and procurement of office facilities and equipment;
- engagement of policy through dissemination of FSS development research, especially through the production of policy briefs;
- catalyzing policy dialogue through policy analysis in the form of compilation of a critical digest of national policies;
- constituency building through organisation of public platforms for dialogue in seven regional cities.

The EC Civil Society Fund is a €10 million program that runs over the next five years, up to 2010. It was initiated in support of non-state actors and is financed by the European Union through European Development Fund in cooperation with the Ethiopian Government.

Conference of CODESRIA Journals Editors

The Council for the Development of Social Science Research in Africa (CODESRIA) organised a two-day conference of the editors and managing editors of the Council's journals, Bulletin and the Africa Review of Books in Dakar, Senegal. In his welcoming statement, Prof. Adebayo Olukoshi, CODESRIA Executive Secretary, underlined the that the conference was part of the drive to ensure that the quality of CODESRIA journals is up to the standard of an African brand name in the production of scientific knowledge. The Conference, which was held on 17-18 February 2007, discussed several aspects of technical and management aspects of journal production, marketing and promotion. A critical appraisal of CODESRIA journals was presented by three resource persons,

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namely, Olajide Oloyede, Fabien Boulaga and Zenebework Taddesse. Francis Nyamnjoh, Head of Publications and Dissemination, talked about the Council's Publications Policy while Ms. Zenebework, former president of CODESRIA, made a presentation on the 'Editorial challenges of modern scholarly publishing'. FSS was represented at the Conference by Dr Taye Assefa, who took over from Ms. Zenebework as Managing Editor of the *Africa Review of Books*.

The Africa Review of Books (ARB) is a bi-annual and bilingual publication of CODESRIA hosted and managed by the Forum for Social Studies in Addis Ababa. The ARB French section is managed by the Centre de Recherche en Anthropologie Sociale et Culturelle (CRASC) based in Algeria, while the English section as well as overall editorial production is handled by the FSS. So far, four regular issues and one special issue in Portuguese have been produced, while the fifth issue will come out by the end of March.

The ARB is emerging as a singular continental publication of high quality reviews of Africa-related works. Among its essays are reviews authored by some of Africa's internationally acclaimed scholars such as Thandika Mkandawire and Mahmoud Mamdani. In his critical appraisal, Prof. Olajide Oloyede rated the quality of ARB's reviews as being of similar standard as that of the *London Review of Books* and the *Times Literary Supplement*.

Training on Social Network Analysis

A two-day training workshop aimed at understanding how Social Network Analysis (SNA) helps rural smallholder innovation processes was held from February 13 to 14, 2007 at Ararat Hotel in Addis Ababa. The training was provided to about 25 practitioners working in various agricultural research and academic institutions.

The workshop, titled 'Introduction to Social Network Analysis (SNA)' and organized by the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) and the Ethiopian Development Research Institute (EDRI), brought together participants from the EEPRI, EIAR, EDRI and the Somali Region Pastoral and Agro-Pastoral Research Institute located in Addis Ababa, Amhara, Oromia, Tigray, SNNP and Gambella regions. Ms Senait Seyoum, Poverty Researcher, represented the FSS at the workshop.

The first presentation was made by Dr. D.J. Spielman of IF-PRI on a joint IFPRI/EDRI study titled 'Enabling rural innovation: Findings from a study of Ethiopian smallholders'. This study applied SNA to see how social networks in selected rural sites affected smallholder innovation processes.

Following the presentation, the background and rationale for the workshop (including objectives and expected outputs), as well as the use of the Participant Action Plan Approach (PAPA) were described. The history, basic concepts and elements of SNA were also introduced.

The second day of the workshop involved more hands-on-

experience with SNA, supported with computers on which the SNA software had been downloaded and pairs of participants could practice. This exercise was meant to explain different types of network data, data collection methods, and types of network measures, as well as describe data entry methods, standard centrality measures and approaches of analyzing networks.

At the end of the two days, certificates of participation were handed out to participants by Dr. Kwadwo Asenso-Okyere, ISNAR Division Director, together with CDs containing all of the Power Point presentations and handouts distributed in the course of the two-day training.

Threats from Global Climate Change to Ethiopia

The threats to Ethiopia from the global climate change are such that policy makers and researchers in the country have to exert concerted efforts to address it without further delay, says a researcher.

Dr. Daniel Kassahun, FSS Environmental Researcher, made the observation during his public lecture on "Global Climate Change and Its Implications in Ethiopia" delivered at the Ethiopian Civil Service College (ECSC) on February 26, 2007. Dr. Daniel underlined the adverse impact of global warming, due to uncontrolled emission of green house gasses, is likely to be exacerbated by local rapid population growth, massive natural resource degradation, growing vulnerability of households to frequent crop failures and food insecurity, among others.

He urged researchers and policy makers to exert more effort to scale up local climate change adaptation measures while enhancing the sustainable management of natural resources in the country.

More than 300 students of the ECSC's Law School attended the lecture. During the general discussion, participants expressed the need to involve policy makers, legislators, civil society and the private sector in similar future discussions.

Meeting on Population, Health and Environment in Ethiopia

A one-day meeting organized by the Packard Foundation was held in Addis Ababa on 13th February 2007. The meeting, which focused on the integration of population, health and environment issues in Ethiopia, started with a welcome address by Ato Sahlu Haile, Ethiopia Country Representative of David and Lucile Packard Foundation. The keynote address was delivered by His Excellency Dr. Kebede Worku, State Minister of the Federal Ministry of Health.

The discussion highlighted that decades of rapid population growth in Ethiopia had contributed to over-farming and deforestation, which degraded the environment and undermined development. Despite this, many scholars see the opportunities to integrate population, environment and health issues in the country's development programs. But a new study reveals that the integration has hardly been realized.

The study conducted by Desalegn Rahmato, Yeraswork Admassie and Yared Mekonen has revealed that the integration of the population, environment and health issues in all surveyed institutions is very limited.

Another presentation made by Mr Bjorn Ljungvist, Country Representative of UNICEF, highlighted the key issues of girls' education in Ethiopia in light of health, equality and protection vis-à-vis the Millennium Development Goals. The discussions on 'Empowering young girls: Health, education, equality, and protection", stressed that increasing girls' education and women's opportunities can improve women's health and stabilize population growth. The poor state of women's health is also a barrier to development.

The meeting, which was attended by representatives of various NGOs, CSOs, and GOs, also discussed a study titled "Conceptual framework and global experiences on the integration of population, health and environment" presented by Roger Mark, Geoff Dabelko, and a representative from Kenya. In addition, Ababu Anage from the Federal EPA, made a presentation on "Environmental challenges and national development in Ethiopia".

Partnership Against Child Sexual Abuse

Five child-centered organizations established a joint pilot project to promote the awareness and participation of the public in the prevention of child sexual abuse in Addis Ababa.

Children Aid-Ethiopia (CHAD-ET), Forum on Street Children Ethiopia (FSCE), African Network for the Prevention of/and Protection against Child Abuse and Neglect (ANPPCAN), Organization for Prevention, Rehabilitation and Reintegration of Female Street Children (OPRIFS) and Child Abuse and Neglect Unit (CANU) established the project titled "Multisectoral joint project for the prevention and rehabilitation from sexual abuse of children". The project is also aimed at delivering an integrated service for victims.

According to a communiqué by CHAD-ET, the project, which is implemented in Addis Ketema Sub-city of Addis Ababa, has three major objectives: Promoting the participation of the community in the prevention of the problem; Rescuing protecting, rehabilitating, and reintegrating trafficked or sexually exploited children from further abuse and assisting them to reintegrate with the society; and Providing legal aid for children suffering from sexual abuse, case follow-up for proper filing of the prosecution and subsequent legal procedures.

The project has been making efforts to provide a holistic service for children abused and/or trafficked to Addis Ababa from different administrative regions of the country, the statement reads. The way the network operates is once a child is

reported to one of the project offices and/or drop-in-center of CHAD-ET or FSCE, the community worker assigned there will first take the child to CANU for physical examination and for obtaining a medical certificate. The same community worker then takes the child to the police station, followed by the provision of counseling service by ANPPCAN, and provision of temporary shelter by OPRIFS. The legal representation in courts will be handled by ANPPCAN.

Violence against women and children is nowadays becoming a common social problem in the country. Although the majority of cases are believed not to be reported by the victims or family members of abused children, the number of reported cases is showing an increase through time.


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
